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A famous count, Benedykt Henryk Tyszkiewicz, got really invested in this place. With his initiative, several buildings appeared - the church, the manor, and a few smaller houses for his servants to live in. He also built a school, which I want to point out specifically.

During my dad's childhood, when Leonid Brezhnev was in charge, this Lithuanian Renaissance building was counting its last days.

As you can see in the photos, there is an empty space, which can appear as an ordinary parking lot. It's the exact location where the school used to stand. Demolition happened because workers from the factory (you can see its windows in the background) complained they were not getting enough sunlight because it was blocked by this huge square three-story building.

Since this was a darker period in politics, it is barely surprising, although later on, allegations were made. However, nothing will ever bring it back to where it was. From what I've heard, it used to look amazing, and I still wish I could see it.
